

PART 1: OWNING THE COMMAND

- 1. Who does Jesus give the command to 'make disciples' to? Are you convinced that this command still rests on all of God's people?
 - If it is just the eleven there, then they are probably functioning representatively which means the command is give *to the church*.
 - Ephesians 4:11-12 says that shepherds and teachers are there for 'equipping *the saints* for the work of the ministry'.
 - If it is only for the apostles, then why does Jesus say he will be with them till the 'end of the age'?
 - Given that Matthew starts with the statement that Jesus is the son of
 Abraham, and blessing the nations was such a key component of the

- blessing to Abraham, is it not a good reading to see this as being the next step in how the nations will be blessed through Abraham?
- 2. When you think of your own life, do you recognise Jesus' command to you personally to make disciples?

- 3. What does the bible say about those hindrances?
- 4. Jesus tells the disciples to baptise people into the name of the Father,

 baptising them into the new covenant (a key issue in Matthew); are you
 convinced?
- 5. Jesus told us to teach the nations to 'observe' all that he commanded.

 Can we point to a time in our lives where we have done this?
- 6. Jesus' command starts with a 'therefore'. How does Jesus' authority shape the way we hear the command to go and make?
- 7. How is Jesus promise to be with us always to the end of the age a comfort and an encouragement?
